

# MINUTES, MEETING FOR BUSINESS

APRIL 22, 2001

The meeting started at 11:27AM with a short period of silence, and a reading from the book *Courage to Grow* by Ruth Fawell, a British author. Present were: Jean Rosenberg, Olive and Ted Colwell, Priscilla Baker, Marshall Hoagland, Jerry McBride, Grace Seale, Anais Mitchell, and Cheryl Mitchell.

1. The minutes of the March 18, 2001 Monthly Meeting for Business were approved.
2. Grace Seale reported on the April 8, 2001 meeting of Ministry & Counsel. They welcomed David Tier as a newly appointed member of the committee, and accepted with regret the resignation of Anne Corrigan. There was discussion of the Spiritual Formation Program being proposed at both the Yearly Meeting and the Quarterly Meeting levels. It was felt that a more local program might be preferable for our situation. The committee originally called the Death & Dying Committee has considered changing its name to the End of Earthly Life Committee, but there has been some objections to both these names. Further consideration will be given to the name. This committee consists of Grace Seale, Ruth Barenbaum, Priscilla Baker, and Faith Lowell. Its purpose is to facilitate matters for participants of the meeting in the event of death of a person in the group, including keeping a record of individuals' preferences for arrangements, having available various legal documents, and assisting in any food or housing arrangements for families in mourning.
3. There was a review of Adult Discussions for the coming year, a topic that had been discussed by Ministry & Counsel. It was decided that during the summer months there would be several gatherings to study *The Earth Charter*, and a regular adult discussion on September 23. This latter session will be after a major statewide gathering at Shelburne Farms scheduled for September 9 on the Charter, and which for those attending should provide additional insights into the plan. Jean Rosenberg and Ted Colwell will be shepherding this study program.  
Beginning in October, we will hold monthly adult discussions on the topic "Ministering to One Another," which follows up on our Potluck meeting on March 11 on this same topic.
4. Treasurer Olive Colwell read the following report on the finances:  
In March 2001 our contributions totaled \$445.00 for the month, and the expenses amounted to \$120.00. Included in expenses were payments for costs of printing the Newsletter and postage. For the nine months of our fiscal year we have received

\$6,309.00 from contributions, and our expenditures were \$5,730.85. Our cash balance as of March 31, 2001 was \$2,521.69.

In April so far we have received gifts of \$350.00 and had expenses of \$1,101.27, which covered quarterly contributions to NEYM, NWQM, and three months rent to the Parent/Child Center, plus two videotapes on Iraq. We expect a bill for this month's newsletter. The present cash balance is \$1,770.42.

We approved a payment of \$80.00 to the College Chaplains' Office to cover our share of the costs of the Lecture given by Professor Abbas Alnasrawi of the UVM Department of Economics. The meeting will be at 4:30 PM on April 30 at the Jones Seminary Room (second floor of the former Geonomics Institute). Professor Alnasrawi will be speaking on the sanctions against Iraq. This meeting is sponsored by "The Committee of Concern for the Iraqi People" and involves not only MFM and the Chaplains' Office, but various campus groups including the Islamic Society of Middlebury College, Amnesty International, Maika Simone Peace Project, and the InterVarsity Christian Fellowship.

5. Anais Mitchell told us about her desire to go with other New England Yearly Meeting Young Adult Friends to Cuba, where she would attend Cuban Yearly Meeting and also visit a number of monthly meetings in that country. The trip will take place from August 8 to 15. Anais has met with a Clearness Committee of our meeting, which has enthusiastically approved her participation, and with other groups of NEYM. The meeting gave its wholehearted approval and support to Anais, and authorized the Clerks to prepare an appropriate Letter of Introduction. Also, it was agreed that \$200.00 be given to Anais from the Quaker Camps & Conferences allocation to help cover the estimated \$1,200.00 cost of the trip. We will also make available to Friends an opportunity to individually contribute additional funds to Anais. Furthermore, Anais will report to meeting what medical supplies may be helpful to take with her for the Cuban Friends.

6. The status of the Mid-week Meetings for Worship was discussed, and will be continued at least through May. A decision on meetings during the summer will be discussed at the May Business Meeting.

7. The Annual Celebration of Life will take place on Sunday, May 13 at the home of Burt Knopp in Orwell. We selected as the theme for the day *Courage to Grow*. Jerry McBride volunteered to serve as facilitator, and there will be a sign-up sheet for people needed to help Burt to set up and then clean up.

8. We also authorized Grace Seale to write a letter of congratulations to David Moats, Editorial Page Editor of the Rutland Herald, on winning a Pulitzer Prize for his editorials on the Civil Union Bill. David at one time attended our Meeting.

The meeting ended with a silent prayer at 12:47 PM.

“Ciao” means both good bye and hello, one of the many subtleties in the Italian language that communicates how the interconnections between people are eternal.



## LIBRARY ACQUISITIONS

Our library has come into the possession of a number of books on living more simply. Plain living is one of the basics of the Quaker way, so these volumes should be of interest to many people.

*Voluntary Simplicity: Toward a way of Life that is Outwardly Simple, Inwardly Rich*, by Duane Elgin is one of the early books on this subject, the first edition having come out in 1981 and a second edition following in 1993. It staked out the broad parameters of how individuals can live much plainer lives that can be richer than the normal mad pursuit of possessions. Elgin stressed living with balance.

Another old-timer is *Living More with Less*, by Doris Janzen Longacre, a Mennonite. It is a very practical guide to how to live, and contains a multitude of ideas on how one can practice a less money-oriented life. Longacre comes up with recipes, games, plans for making toys, clothing patterns, and so forth. She has drawn on her own and other Mennonites' experience.

A much more recent book is *Simpler Living/Compassionate Life: A Christian Perspective*. This is an anthology of essays on the topic of simple living and deals primarily with the basic reasons and history of this way of life. Among the contributors are Henri Nouwen, Richard Foster, Wendell Berry, Frederick Buechner, and many others prominent in the field. The book also contains a study guide.

Much more practical and loaded with the stories of actual people who have tried to change towards simplicity is *Choosing Simplicity: Real People Finding Peace and Fulfillment in a Complex World*. It is authored by Linda Breen Pierce who for a number of years has been collecting data in this area.

Finally, there is a national best-seller, *Your Money or Your Life: Transforming Your Relationship with Money and Achieving Financial Independence*, by Joe Dominguez and Vicki Robin. This book has had a phenomenal success and has helped many people to get control of their finances through careful attention to where they are spending their funds. By equating dollars to hours worked, the authors show how so much of our time is used in nonessential spending. They demonstrate how people can cut their expenses, invest cautiously and wisely, and be able to retire at an early age.
