

SILENT RETREAT DAY

In preparation for the Stillness Retreat on June 23, we would like to share this writing from Bo Lozoff, a founder of the Human Kindness Foundation, a prisoner advocacy group. Mr. Lozoff will be entering a year of silence on the September Full Moon!

"One way of practicing silence is to retreat from all your normal activities and from the presence of others to the greatest degree possible. If you can't go to a cabin in the woods or some other isolated place, you may want to simply spend the day in your cell or your bedroom. However you arrange it, here are a few tips to get the most out of a day of silent retreat:

- Plan your meals in advance, and plan for only about half of what you may normally eat. This helps you to be quieter. Simple foods are best. I take a heel of bread and some fruit with me. Sometimes I fast entirely.
- Do not spend a lot of the day reading. If you choose to read at all, plan it in advance and limit it to breif spiritual writings which may help you to work with silence. Do not listen to music of watch television.
- Try to spend time in nature, listening and observing. If you have no access to the outdoors, try watching the sky and all its changes through a window. If you have no window, then focus a lot on everything in your cell, even the movement of shadows on the walls, distant sounds, or ants walking across the floor.
- Try not to let thoughts dominate the day. Keep you focus in the here and now. The best way to do this is to focus on perceptions of the senses seeing, listening, touching, smelling, tasting, walking.
- Slow breaths, deeper breaths, help quiet the mind and body. Your breath is the source of your life. Each abreath arises from and returns to silence. When you tap into the BIg Breath and the Great Silence, you'll know it!"

MINUTES, MEETING FOR BUSINESS

MAY 20, 2001

Acting Recording Clerk: Ted Colwell

The meeting began at 11:20 AM with a period of silent worship, during which the Clerk read a portion from the book "Lest Innocent Blood Be Shed" by Philip Hallie. The excerpt dealt with the influence of Quakerism on the pastor in a French village during World War II who organized the community into a place of refuge for Jews in danger of concentration camps.

Present at the meeting were: Priscilla Baker, Jerry McBride, Grace McGrath, Ruth Barenbaum, Mimi Love-Nicholson, Winslow Colwell, Faith Lowell, Olive and Ted Colwell.

- 1. The Minutes of the April 22, 2001 Business Meeting were reviewed and approved.
- 2. Olive Colwell gave the following Treasurer's Report:

In April 2001 our contributions totaled \$465.00 for the month, and the expenses amounted to \$1,470.87. Included in expenses were payments for Rent to the Parent/ Child Center, payments to NEYM and NWQM, library books and tapes, and printing the newsletter. Also, gifts for Young Friends graduating from high school, a scholarship for an adult young Friend's trip to Cuba, and for a contribution to the Chaplain's Office in connection with the lecture on Iraq. For the nine months of our fiscal year we have received \$6,774.00 from contributions, and our expenditures were \$7,201.72. Our cash balance as of April 30, 2001 was \$1,515.82.

In April so far we have received gifts of \$245.00 and had expenses of \$35.84, which covered purchase of an extended arm stapler that will allow us to save on the printing bills as we can do the stapling and folding in house. We will have a bill for this month's newsletter and some additional stamps. The present cash balance is \$1724.98.

- 3. Olive then presented the Proposed Budget for the 2001-2002 Fiscal Year, a copy of which is attached hereto. After discussion, the meeting was in agreement that the Proposed Budget be submitted for approval at the June Meeting for Business. There was the suggestion made that the Newsletter include a notice that the Minutes are available on the Meeting's Web Page (www.middlebury.edu/~jmcbride/mfm.htm) for those who do not need a printed copy.
- 4. Jerry McBride reported on the May 6, 2001 meeting of Ministry & Counsel Committee. Items not discussed later included a report of the Spiritual Formation Group program, an in depth commitment to deeper Quaker practices. Grace McGrath has information on this. Plans were made for the May 13 Celebration of Life at Burt Knopp's home in Orwell. The theme this year was The Courage to Grow. Jerry has

agreed to attend the Northwest Quarter Meeting on June 2-3 at Farm & Wilderness Camps, and represent MFM at the Ministry & Counsel session. We are awaiting a report from Jean Rosenberg and Ted Colwell on the summertime gatherings to study The Earth Charter. Win Colwell was asked to read a Query at the May 20th Meeting for Worship. Donna Belcher reported that the First Day School program this year has been a success and appreciated by the children. The teachers, Donna, Fran Putnam and John Benson did an outstanding job and their efforts are most deserving of thanks from all. Donna has agreed to organize next year's program, will meet with teachers and parents in June, and then train teachers in the program.

- 5. The former End of Earthly Life Committee agreed to change its name again to be the Passage with Care Committee, a name suggested by Jean Burfoot. In further discussion, members of the Committee reported that they were contacting the practices of other meetings and churches. Also, they are planning to make available for families of departed Friends to have a memorial tree planted in a small grove on the property of the Parent/Child Center. The P/CC has agreed to allow plantings at the border of their property and they will be consulted about exact placement and varieties of trees to be planted. This concept was approved. This committee is currently meeting monthly.
- 6. Ruth Barenbaum reported on a proposal for individuals from MFM to attend the 5 PM meetings of the Wake Robin Worship Group in Shelburne, VT on a First Day once every other month. Burlington Meeting will also participate, covering the alternate months. Ruth has agreed to organize our participation, and will herself attend in June and August. This effort was approved.
- 7. It was agreed that the Mid-week Meetings for Worship would be laid down during the months of June, July and August. It was suggested that Friends make time to visit Eleanor Gibson, who has graciously allowed us to use her home for these meetings.
- 8. A Committee to review the rules and procedures for funds flowing through the account of the Meeting for special purposes, and to clarify the appointment of Released Friends was discussed. Jerry McBride, Spence Putnam (to be asked), Faith Lowell and Ted Colwell volunteered to serve.
- 9. Winslow Colwell reported on the May 2, 2001 meeting of the Peace & Social Concerns Committee held at the home of Ruth Barenbaum. Ruth has agreed to visit other churches and meetings in our area to seek additional support and interest in the ending of the Iraqi sanctions. The committee has been focussing on the Iraqi situation, but is now beginning to expand its scope. During the latest meeting there was discussion on Globalization, Global Warming, and the correct ways of approach in political action. There was considerable planning on protesting the Death Penalty, and it was agreed that letters would be sent to local newspapers. (Three such letters have been published.) There is consultation taking place with such people and groups as Professor Ellen Oxfeld and the Chaplain's Office at Middlebury College, plus others, which may

lead to a major conference on the Iraqi situation this fall. The next meeting of the P & S. C. Committee will take place on June 13.

- 10. Ruth Barenbaum reported on the Volunteers for Peace program. The organization is planning to send volunteers to the Middlebury Area in August and October. However, in discussions with ACCAG, the group that has handled these visits in the past, it appears that there is as yet no definitive planning being done. In 2000 the meeting arranged several opportunities for hospitality for the Volunteers for Peace group, and we would like to do so again, if possible. We agreed to discuss this matter again in June and to work to involve more groups and individuals in this international activity.
- 11. There was discussion about an old Minute on the Death Penalty approved by MFM a number of years ago, but which can not be located. Hence, it was agreed that the Peace & Social Concerns Committee begin drafting a new minute. To increase the input on this minute, the committee will hold a special meeting to which all interested can attend and make contributions to the wording. Winslow Colwell in the interim will talk to Joseph Gainza of AFSC-Vermont to coordinate our efforts with the larger Quaker actions.
- 12. Ted Colwell presented the proposed Report of the Nominating Committee, which is also attached hereto. It will be presented at the June Business Meeting for final approval.

13. We also established the dates for events through the month of July 2001.

The meeting ended at 12:50 P.M. with a reverent time of silence.
