

MINUTES, MEETING FOR BUSINESS

JUNE 17, 2001

The meeting began at 11:30 AM with a moment of silence during which Co-Clerk Jean Rosenberg read a passage from Faith and Practice in which we were reminded that “to be inwardly still is to be aware of the center.” The center is what is most real, most truly important. Nine people attended including Jean Rosenberg, Laura Asermily, Olive Colwell, Fran and Spence Putnam, Joanna Colwell, Cheryl Mitchell, and Grace McGrath.

1. Minutes: Approved the minutes of the May 20, 2001 Meeting For Business.
2. Ministry & Counsel: A report was given of the June 3, 2001 meeting. Items not discussed later in this report included an update from Jerry McBride on Quarterly meeting which he attended. He reported on how other meetings handle pastoral care and special funds. Burlington Meeting reported that hundreds of people were provided with overnight accommodation during the recent protest action in Quebec. All meetings were represented at Quarterly Meeting except Putney.
3. Treasurer’s Report: The proposed 2001-2002 budget of \$7,800 published in last month’s newsletter was approved without changes. As of June 20, 2001, we met our 2000-2001 budget of \$7,400. Included in May expenses were payments for a scholarship to Friends Camp, the printing of the newsletter, and purchase of a large stapler for use on the newsletter. June expenses included purchase of stamps and summer child care.
4. Nominating Committee: The May 20, 2001 report of the Nominating Committee was approved. It was noted that the meeting was still looking for a third First Day school teacher to cover the spring session.
5. First Day School Report: A report of the June 10, 2001 First Day School meeting organized by Donna Belcher was shared. All parents and teachers were able to attend. John Benson will continue teaching. Joanna Colwell will teach in the fall. Another person is needed for the spring. Donna will offer training late in the summer and ongoing support. The teachers for this past year were dedicated and enthusiastic and the children loved it. Teachers created their own lessons based on the Sathya Sai Education in Human Values curriculum. Cheryl Mitchell expressed gratitude for knowing that this was happening. The meeting supports having children share silence with us for the first 10 minutes of Meeting for Worship beginning in the fall as had been the practice in the past. It was agreed that we should continue to discussion about expanding the size of First Day School to include our older children. Currently, First Day School includes three girls aged 5-8. It was suggested that older children might be supported financially by the meeting in

attending Junior Yearly Meeting which many remembered making a significant difference for their children into coming more fully into the Quaker community.

6. Child care: Summer child care will be covered by Middlebury Union High School student Heather Jenkins at \$10 per Sunday whether or not children show up. Back-up child care providers include Terra Nicholson and Anna Heather-Lea.

7. Parent Child Space: PCC asked if we wanted to have input into their plans to build a garage with a meeting space larger than our current space above it. Some concerns were expressed regarding whether this space would suit our needs, for instance, if toxins were to come up from the garage. Some recognized that being in a separate space from First Day School, as is the successful practice in Burlington and South Starksboro, could be advantageous. Some wondered if we should consider sharing Havurah space. We agreed that we would continue discussion of our space needs. We also agreed that we could still support PCC in some way with their expansion plans whether we stay in our current space or move since they value our use and guidance.

8. Special Funds Committee: Spence Putnam reported that a committee was formed consisting of himself, Jerry McBride, Ted Colwell, and Faith Lowell to discuss issues of requesting and setting up special funds. The committee has met once and plans to recommend a procedure for requesting special funds. Input from Friends on this topic is welcomed.

9. Peace & Social Concerns Committee: Joanna Colwell reported that the committee met to draft a letter of support to Jim Jeffords for his courage in speaking truth. Individual friends are urged to write also. She announced that bake sales will be organized to support their next large action against globalization and that a float celebrating local sustainable agriculture will be prepared for the Bristol Fourth of July Parade. Anyone interested in helping on the float or being in the parade can speak with her. In other business, the committee will meet to draft a minute on the death penalty that could be expanded to include a reverence for all life.

10. Passage with Care Committee: This is the new name of the Death and Dying Committee. Forms are being updated and will be distributed to Friends wishing to express their wishes regarding their deaths. The committee is also putting together a packet of information on resources to be available to those who are interested. They are in touch with the memorial Society, currently in Williston, and the Funeral Alliance in Hinesburg. Both give information regarding simplicity in funeral arrangements. A list of places where people could have memorial services will be offered.

11. Volunteers for Peace: The meeting will ask Ruth Barenbaum if she needs assistance with the Volunteers for Peace Group. ACCAG has not reported their needs as yet.

12. Earth Charter: Jean Rosenberg reported that a discussion on the Earth Charter will be held at her home at 7:30 PM on July 15, 2001.

The meeting ended at 1 PM with a reverent time of silence.
