

22:02:01 Opening Worship

22:02:02 Agenda review

The agenda was reviewed and accepted.

22:02:03 Review of Minutes

Minutes of the 21 November 2021 Meeting for Business were reviewed and approved. Appreciation goes to Leigh Harder for her fine attention to detail in doing these minutes.

22:02:04 Co-Clerks Report

~The clerks observed and are concerned with the lack of speedy volunteering for the roles of greeter and Zoom host, and invited discussion of possible options. Ideas included Friends choosing to sign up for several consecutive weeks in the role, as well as other creative possibilities. Given that we are currently gathering only via Zoom, Spence Putnam will send Zoom-Specific instruction to supplement those previously circulated for hybrid gatherings. ~"Passage of the Month"

The draft chapter on Ministry & Counsel by the Yearly Meeting Faith & Practice Revision Committee was read and discussed:

"In some circumstances the meeting itself is seeking clearness about its role in a prospective mutual and covenant relationship. This is the case when M&C forms a clearness committee for membership or marriage under the care of the meeting. It also applies when Ministry & Counsel forms a clearness committee to consider taking a person's ministry under its care. These clearness procedures are two-way streets. Those asking for clearness are looking for the committee's assistance in determining their readiness for membership, marriage, or ministry and for helping in their preparation for these new roles. The meeting is coming to its own clearness about taking the Friend into membership at this point, or holding a wedding under its care, or supporting a ministry."

As we considered this draft, we were reminded that at Middlebury Meeting Ministry & Counsel functions in three associated but separate parts: Fellowship, Pastoral Care, and Ministry & Counsel. Their functions are, by definition, closely related though each of these groups directs attention to meet specific needs of the Meeting.

The Ad Hoc committee reviewing this draft requests Friends to consider additions or comments in this process, and share with clerks.

22:02:05 Bayard Rustin Fund discussion

During Sessions 2021 NEYM approved the Bayard Rustin Fund for Support and Action.

The intention of the new fund is to "support LGBTQIA+ organizations in East Africa, Central and South America, India, the Caribbean, and North America".

The body also approved allowing monthly meetings to redirect to this fund the portion of their Yearly Meeting contribution which would otherwise go to Friends United Meeting. (This is currently 1.4%, about \$44 for MFM)

That redirection is expected to "assist monthly meetings in their witness as well as target support to initiatives that resist current anti-trans youth legislation by increasing the visibility of efforts and opportunities for collaboration across NEYM".

The fund is open and ready to receive contributions from monthly meetings and individuals.

Discussion of the issue followed, with a variety of viewpoints respectfully

expressed. We are reminded of the multiple implications of coercion in financial ways, of our needs to hold true to our strong values, of taking actions that may impede communication among those with differing viewpoints. We recognized that we have already agreed to add the fund to our annual benevolences. We agreed not to direct contributions to NEYM to the fund since we are not in unity to do that. Individuals may contact the Treasurer to have funds re-directed.

22:02:06 Treasurer's/Finance Committee report, including the proposed budget

The Treasurer's Report of 16 January submitted by Laura Asermily was discussed, reviewed, and approved.

A Friend suggested that each newsletter might include an explanation of one or two of our benevolences. Laura volunteered to help establish this practice.

Middlebury Friends Meeting Financial Review Statement for Fiscal Year 2021 February 18, 2022

I have reviewed the financial statements of the Middlebury Friends Meeting for the period January 1, 2021 through December 31, 2021 and made random checks on disbursements and receipts, with particular attention to checks cashed by recipients of our "benevolences." It should be noted that the bank account balance of Middlebury Friends Meeting has at times approached \$20,000. In addition to the regular budget the treasurer has had responsibility for accepting, keeping track of, and disbursing a number of non-budget funds, including monies in the Rachel Carey Harper Fund, Vision for Vermont (which has now been terminated), and various special donation funds. She has also been responsible for tax filings in connection with our contract employees.

I was given complete access to the online and paper bank records of the Meeting by Laura Asermily, Meeting Treasurer. It is my opinion based on this partial review that the financial books of the Meeting are in good order and that the record-keeping is thorough and accurate.

I would like to note that Karen Nawn-Fahey passed the treasurer role to Laura in 2021 and was very helpful in the transition period. She deserves our thanks for her valuable service.

Despite being physically apart for most of the year, Friends have felt supported and nurtured by the Spirit and one another. Love and kindness flowed through and around us. The traditions and structures of the Meeting provided a sense of closeness and cohesion despite the discontinuities and challenges of the pandemic and other world situations. Our way of worship was an anchor for many: Settling-in, healing circle, deep silent listening, vocal ministry, sharing afterthoughts, brief announcements, the birthday song all contributed to a comfortable rhythm on First Days and framed personal worship for some. We were grateful to technology for allowing us to see and hear one another, and grateful to Friends who entered the experiment with hybrid worship with patience and perseverance. We worshipped with Friends near and far and felt a part of the wider Quaker Community, yet worried about those Friends for whom the use of technology was not an option or not a pleasure.

Opportunities beyond First Day worship reinforced the sense of knowing and connecting with one another: Wednesday evening worship, Quaker Coffee House, First Day School, adult education and friendly forums, Meeting for Business, the library, the newsletter, men's group, the women's holiday gathering, our in-person out-of-doors celebrations (the summer picnic at Maritime Museum and the holiday bonfire at Rosenbergs'). Work in smaller committees such as Fellowship, Earthcare, Faith and Practice Revision, Worship and Study, Finance, Children's program, Technology, NEYM Called Committee, both brought us closer and provided a structure for the ongoing vitality of the meeting. Pastoral Care had a huge and deep role. Friends were deeply grateful to them and concerned that they might be overwhelmed at some point by our

increasing needs as a community. Despite the moments of darkness, grief and discouragement, the Meeting has sustained us in working for climate change, social justice, and healing. We have learned that a physical location is not essential to being gathered. We can meet the Guide in worship wherever and however we may be.

We are connected to many Spirit Infused groups in the extended Quaker World: North West Quarterly Meeting, New England Yearly Meeting, Friends Camp, Farm and Wilderness Camps, Pendle Hill, Woolman Hill, Powell House, Beacon Hill Friends House, Friends Committee on National Legislation, AFSC, Quaker Earthcare Witness. We connect with many non-Quaker groups who are also working toward a more just and inclusive world. We long to deepen our relationship with members of the Abenaki, migrant, and BIPOC communities. We have watched with joy as young people who grew up in the Meeting are now moving gracefully in the wider world. And we continue to hold a concern that so many of our members are aging and younger families are not taking their place.

The overarching feeling of our gathering was the Ocean of Light rolling over the Ocean of Darkness with waves of love and kindness.

Aspirations for the coming year:

Friends also spent time dreaming of ways we would like to deepen our connection with Spirit and strengthen our connections with the wider community.

- carry out more intentional outreach to Middlebury College,
- learn to use technology more effectively so that we can have a more vibrant on-line presence (and make it easier for seekers to find us),
- work with other groups on issues of mutual concern (perhaps sponsoring another visit and discussion with George Lakey),
- use our library as a support for committees and other groups,
- sponsor book discussions,
- hold public outdoor events,
- expand opportunities for our young people to engage with others,
- promote social and emotional connections between meeting members:
- meals on zoom?
- coffee klatches after worship?

- share the work of pastoral care more broadly,
- provide adult education opportunities such as the Elements of Quakerism course,
- create more formal connections with our Abenaki neighbors,
- read The Gatherings together.

We are grateful to those who contribute to the vibrancy of our Meeting in so many ways (holding the Meeting in prayer, worshiping together, helping to make decisions, deepening their own practice, serving on committees) and know that our best intentions for the future will be nurtured by this support.
