# Middlebury Friends Meeting

## Monthly Meeting for Business

19 June, 2016

**16.06.01 Monthly meeting opened with continued reading** from Patricia Loring's *Listening Spirituality, Vol II, this month* on leadings.

**16.06.02 May 13, 2016 minutes:** Co-clerk Tom Baskett suggested some adjustments and corrections:

Item #5, COSA, FOLLOWUP: The sentence "*COSA will discuss further the request from Jubilee VT, including if and how to present this to MFM for contribution*" should be changed to "...and determine what recommendations to make to Meeting."

Item # 6, W & S, #3, Friendly Forums, last sentence, "Fall, 2016 FFs will focus on the book *Active Hope* by Joanna Macy" should be changed to "W & S and Earthcare will discuss ways to introduce the book, *Active Hope*."

Item #12, should be deleted (left over from previous minutes)

**16.06.03 Treasurer's Report** (Karen Nawn-Fahey) All statements in this report are as of May 31, 2016. During May, the Meeting had donations of \$3,245.

During April, Meeting expenditures totaled \$905. This includes \$205 for notecards and directories, \$160 for children's program coordination, \$40 for childcare, \$100 to Summer Lunch Program, and \$400 to NEYM for Summer Session Scholarship. When these checks clear, the bank balance should be \$4,605.54.

Karen reported that Sas Carey's NEYM Legacy Grant has been received.

**16.06.04 Earthcare Committee** (Fran Putnam, reported by Chris Stackhouse)

1. The committee discussed a program for MFM based on the book *Active Hope* by Joanna Macy (see book review in this month's MFM Newsletter). An outline of the program is included, below\*. We believe this program will be very valuable for our Meeting and hope many can participate. Worship and Study Committee will co-sponsor the program. There is also serious interest at ICAN (Interfaith Climate Action Network) and MACA (Middlebury Area Clergy Association) in presenting something for the community on Joanna Macy and *Active Hope*.
2. We decided to postpone a presentation about the Carbon Pollution Tax until after those responsible for this proposal have reworked it in preparation for a new session of the Vermont Legislature. More information will be forthcoming.

3. The Earthcare Committee will sponsor a 45-minute informational session at the rise of Meeting on Sunday, July 17 for anyone interested in finding out more about alternatives to hooking up to the VT Gas pipeline.

\* Outline for a program centered on the book *Active Hope* by Joanna Macy (edited for the newsletter by the recording clerk):

- 1) Have a reading group for anyone interested, three tea and talk sessions, the first session on Part I of the book, the second on Part II, and the third on Part III. These would be held on **Sunday afternoons, at 4 pm, on August 21, Sept 18, and Oct 2.** (August 21 is the rain date for the MFM summer picnic, but there is plenty of time for people to get to the discussion group.) We could invite a few other people to join the discussion group . . . e.g., from ICAN.
- 2) **Have a 3 hour workshop on Active Hope on Saturday morning, Oct 8,** that addresses the process of the Spiral of Empowerment. It would be open to MFM folks. . It would be good to keep the number to about 20. . .
- 3) **The workshop could be revised as needed and offered more broadly in the community at a later date.**
- 4) **Fran and Jean,** and any others who would like to join them, continue to plan and organize and report to Monthly Meeting.
- 5) **The Sunday afternoon monthly tea and talk discussions might continue beyond these dates.**
- 6) Earthcare and W and S members will be encouraged to send some responses on the book to the newsletter to give Friends an idea of what we would be discussing in the Tea and Talk discussion groups. Chris Stackhouse will go first.

FOLLOW UP: A suggestion was made to purchase more copies of *Active Hope*. MFM Friends agreed to purchase an additional 10 copies which will be used for our discussion group and then, perhaps, offered to local faith or other groups to help promote wider discussion. It was suggested they be purchased either from our local book seller (Vermont Book Shop) or the FGC Quaker Book Store. Friends are reminded there is a book review by Leigh Harder in the last MFM newsletter.

Tom Baskett observed that it appears MFM has a leading involving Earth Care. The co-clerks will discuss whether or not to formally propose a minute concerning this leading.

**16.06.05 Committee on Outreach and Social Action - COSA** (Don Peabody, edited for these minutes by the recording clerk)

1. COSA recommends MFM become a “faith community” member of JubileeUSA/ Vermont and that this group become a part of MFM’s benevolence budget. Jubilee asks a donation of \$1/member. This recommendation is transmitted to the MFM Finance Committee.

2. Follow up measures to the Journey of Healing Workshop were noted:
  1. Notes from the Workshop's small groups have been edited and sent to participants.
  2. As part of the Abenaki's "Seeds of Renewal Project," Middlebury Friends helped Dr. Frederick Wiseman, and staff of the Lake Champlain Maritime Museum (LCMM,) establish a "demonstration garden" on LCMM grounds, with heritage seeds recovered from around New England. Mounds, topped with tripods, were planted with the "three sisters"—corn, squash (pumpkin) and beans. In one experimental mound sunflowers take the place of tripods.
  3. Friends are urged to attend the Abenaki Heritage Festival, June 25 & 26 at LCMM. Dr. Wiseman's presentation on the Seeds of Renewal Project will take place on June 25 at 11:00AM. 4. Don and AliceMae were gifted by Dr. Wiseman with surplus seeds, and have asked Susan Smiley's help in planting and tending them in her garden.
  4. The question is raised: What else might MFM, especially Workshop attendees, be doing as follow-up to the Journey of Healing Workshop?
3. Don reported Northwest Quarterly Meeting hopes Friends, especially those closest to Rutland—Wilderness, Middlebury and Poultney—will help facilitate the anticipated settlement of Syrian Refugees. More will be communicated.
4. COSA reviewed: MFM's submission to FCNL re: legislative priorities, Friends' feedback re: the April Community Supper, and COSA members' feedback re: COSA.

**16.06.06 Worship and Study Committee** (Leigh Harder, edited for these minutes by the recording clerk, reported by Peter Schenck): We discussed ongoing topics (query readers, Friendly Forums and All Ages Religious Education) and agreed we need more time to discuss the W & S committee description, hopefully at our next meeting. Also needing more discussion is the MFM Practices booklet. Shulamith has written a description of the Experiment with Light which we propose to include in the next reworking of the booklet. We will look more closely at the booklet for further adjustments.

We noted the reorganized Newsletter and will communicate with Win our gratitude for his attention to this. We want to invite Friends to contribute inspirational pieces, spiritual biographies and book reviews.

Joanna Macey's *Active Hope*: We discussed our wish to move forward on a Meeting-wide consideration of the book. Jean will explore how W & S and Earthcare committees can work together on this. (See Earthcare Committee report, item #4, above, including the outline for a program focused on Active Hope.)

**16.06.07 Fellowship Committee:** (Spence Putnam, reported by Teresa Hyndman) The newly-reconstituted Fellowship Committee (Rebecca Holmes, Teresa Hyndman,

Jake Jacobs, and Spence Putnam) met recently with the co-clerks to review its responsibilities and how the committee will relate to other Meeting committees to carry out these responsibilities. Rebecca agreed to review the duties of the Greeter (short list and detailed list), suggest some modifications if necessary, and circulate them to the committee. We will organize a summer outing at Branbury State Park on Sunday, August 14th (rain date August 21) from 1-5 pm. There will be a potluck picnic lunch at 1:30 and various games and activities. We plan to invite members of Havurah and CVUUS to join us.

**FOLLOW UP:** MFM co-clerks expressed concern that sometimes Fellowship Committee can get overburdened by logistic responsibilities and ask committees and Friends in general to be aware of this and help out when possible.

**16.05.08 Pastoral Care Committee** No report this month.

**16.05.09 Nominating Committee** (Don Peabody): The final draft of the new slate was presented and approved.

**16.06.10 Havurah liaison report:** Chris Stackhouse reported on recent communications with Havurah contact, Karen Lefkoe. Because we rent our space on Sunday mornings, only, we should plan to set up on Sundays and not assume it is OK to come in on Saturday to set up. If a Friend needs help to set up, s/he is encouraged to ask another Friend to help. It was clarified that the space should be returned to the cleanliness upon arrival, including sweeping crumbs from the floor. Friends agreed snack clean up is the responsibility of the person providing hospitality. All Friends are asked to keep an eye out for helping the greeter and hospitality provider with cleaning up.

**16.05.11 NEYM 2016 sessions:** Friends agreed that those who are attending will be our “official” representatives. If anyone has materials and/or the desire to put together a MFM display, about ¼ table size, this would be welcomed.

**16.05.12 Syrian Refugees:** Don Peabody reported that NWQM considered a concern about supporting Syrian refugees slated to settle in Rutland. Wilderness Meeting is the closest meeting. Karen Nawn-Fahey spoke of the problems that have arisen from a few people in Rutland opposed to refugee settlement there. It is anticipated that refugees will arrive in November.

**16.06.13 Orlando Shootings:** Teresa Hyndman noted that many Friends attended the community ecumenical candle light vigil held on the Middlebury town green on June 16. Friends are asked to continue to discuss and hold in the Light our concern about gun violence and the need for safety and for the rights of all.

Meeting closed after a brief moment of silence.
