14.05.01 **Treasurer’s Report** (Karen Nawn-Fahey): “Through April, 2014, the Meeting had member donations of \$760.

“Meeting expenditures through April 30, 2014 totaled \$1,494. This includes \$499 for NEYM, \$600 for Havurah rent, \$125 for NWQM, \$90 for childcare, \$20 for annual state filing, and \$160 for First Day School Coordination.

“When these checks clear, the bank balance will be \$5,505.57.

“During May, I plan to pay our benevolence to the Summer Lunch Program. (A donation was made for) \$100 contribution specifically for the care and maintenance of the gazebo and grounds at Quaker Acres. In May, I wrote a check to Sas Carey for that amount.”

FOLLOW UP: The treasurer asked about how and where financial documents and records are/should be stored. Karen will consult with NEYM about what kind

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of storage other monthly meetings are currently using. Further consideration of this topic is referred to the Finance Committee.

14.05.02 Worship and Study Committee (Tom Baskett): Based on responses from the recent survey and Friendly Forum on All Ages Religious Education, W & S made a proposal for beginning AARE in the fall. After discussion, the following was agreed upon:

Once/month, the first 15 min. of worship will be dedicated to either a story using the curriculum from *Faith and Play*, or the leader that day may choose their own story (read or told) that expresses a Quaker value, testimony or practice. After the story is ended, the children will move to their classroom upstairs to discuss the story/presentation while adults remain in silent worship. There will be no healing circle on that day. At the end of the worship hour, the children will rejoin the worship circle and may share what they discussed or did during First Day School.

It is proposed that we try this for one year, beginning in September, and participate in the Meeting-wide year-long focus on Earthcare. W & S will plot out the exact dates of each month's AARE beginning September 2014. They will coordinate dates with the already established 4 intergenerational meetings throughout the year.

14.05.03 Earthcare Committee (Fran Putnam, edited for these minutes by the recording clerk): The Earthcare Committee did not meet in May since the Celebration of Life was held on our normal meeting date. At our next meeting, on June 1, we will discuss the new queries Priscilla drafted, consult with W & S and prepare a final draft of the queries.

Fran Putnam visited with two teachers from the Aurora School to discuss ways to reduce one-use tableware as well as food waste in the building. The teachers said their students normally do not create much waste and they use reusable tableware when they eat at the school. They did say there is an opportunity for someone to supply some small, plastic glasses for the students in the Hebrew school to replace the paper cups they ordinarily use. The children are felt to be too young to use glasses made of glass. If the Meeting agrees, we could purchase 20 6 oz. plastic cups to be stored in the kitchen at Havurah to be used by anyone using the kitchen.

FOLLOW UP: MFM approved the purchase of 20 reusable, plastic cups, dishwashing soap and a compost bucket from the transfer station. It was noted that we are making steady progress as we move forward in establishing environmentally friendly practices and that it will take time to establish these building-wide.

14.05.04 Outreach and Social Action Committee (COSA) (Tom Dickinson): Most recently, COSA discussed the need to find a new convener when Tom Dickinson steps down. The committee also examined its name and wondered if a different name would more accurately identify its purpose.

The committee reviewed the last Community Supper which presented some

challenges as well as highlights. They raised the question about our future involvement. The community supper organizing committee at the Middlebury UCC is reviewing this ever growing program and how best to proceed. Friends agreed that MFM will want to look more closely at our time, resources and priorities vis a vis our continued participation.

14.05.05 Pastoral Care Committee: No report this month.

14.05.06 Fellowship Committee (Laura Asermily): It was agreed to invite the Havurah congregation to join us for our summer picnic gathering at Lake Dunmore on Aug. 17.

14.05.07 Nominating Committee (Don Peabody): Several changes, additions and corrections were discussed. Don will make final changes to the roster for publication in the next newsletter.

FOLLOW UP: A discussion emerged regarding changes at Havurah. Our backjack seats are showing more wear and tear as a result of use by not only Friends but also Aurora School and Hebrew School students. Soon, some will need to be replaced. Our liaison, Laura Asermily, will explore how the three groups can work together to provide a rotation of replacement as backjacks become unusable. Laura reported that Havurah, in response to our need for more storage, has approved the installation of a second shelving unit, similar in size to our current library shelf. It was suggested that a plan be made to move forward on the construction of a new shelving unit.

14.05.08 NEYM request (from Jean Rosenberg): New England Yearly Meeting requests donations to cover the cost of sending a young adult Friend from Cuba Yearly Meeting to the Quaker Youth Pilgrimage, sponsored by FWCC for Young Friends ages 16-18. New England and Cuba are sister yearly meetings. NEYM seeks to raise \$3000 to send 18 year old Ulises Manuel Bove Rojas, chosen by his YM to go. He recently completed a two-week course at the Cuban Quaker Peace Institute for pastors and leaders of Cuba YM. This year's month-long pilgrimage will visit Quakers in Bolivia and Peru, vibrant centers of the South American Quaker movement. It will include Young Friends from around the world, so is a wonderful opportunity for this Cuban Young Friend, for Cuba YM, and for NEYM in its long term relationship with CYM.

MFM Friends agreed to send \$100 and individual Friends are invited to send contributions. Please send a contribution by check to NEYM, with a notation in the memo line: "QYP Rojas", before June 1.
