

13.11.01 Minutes for 20 October 2013: Accepted as printed in the newsletter.

13.11.02 Treasurer's Report (Karen Nawn-Fahey)

"Through November 16, the Meeting had member donations of \$4085.00. Meeting expenditures through November 16 totaled \$1814.00. This includes rent, NEYM, NWQM totaling \$1224, \$270 for childcare, and \$320 for First Day School.

Benevolences totaling \$3425 were paid through November 16.

When these checks clear, the bank balance will be \$4485.16 of which \$3065.16 is for MFM and the balance of \$1420 belongs to the Farm Workers Coalition. At beginning of this year, bank balance was \$5976.30, of which \$3856.30 belonged to MFM and \$2120 belonged to the Farm Workers Coalition."

Karen reported that she will be meeting with Beth Davis, a tax consultant, regarding correct reporting of payments made to our children's programming coordinator and gifts in-kind. Additionally, she can help to set up a method for people to donate to MFM electronically.

All members of the Meeting community were asked us to send in any receipts for reimbursement as soon as possible.

FOLLOW UP: It was suggested that everyone who wishes to donate an item please submit an invoice as well for repayment. A donation for that amount can then be made to offset it's cost. This will allow the Meeting to see our true costs of operation.

13.11.03 Proposed Budget for 2014 (Karen Nawn-Fahey)

The proposed budget was distributed for the groups inspection. Several questions were asked to clarify certain budget items, including VT Action for Peace, The Clergy Rent Fund, and money spent on child care. It was agreed that we need to clarify the responsibilities and payment rate of our childcare givers, which Lianna will do. It was also suggested that we recommend a November 1st deadline for submitting any invoices or bills to the treasurer for payment.

There was discussion to clarify several items of the list of benevolences. The budget will be printed in this issue of the newsletter.

FOLLOW UP: After a brief discussion it was agreed that the unused \$200 in the contingencies fund should be donated to an agency providing relief for victims of the recent Typhoon in the Philippines. Since Yearly Meeting will be held in Vermont in 2014, an item to help cover the costs of attending was approved for \$400. And it is anticipated that Ann Taylor may need support in the coming year, but rather than create a line item it was suggested that a donation be made to the Meeting earmarked for her.

13.11.04 Climate Committee (Fran Putnam)

Fran attended the annual conference of Interfaith Power and Light, and submitted a report which is published elsewhere in this newsletter. The committee has been making calls to the Meeting community to see if people need guidance in initiating or following-through with their household energy assessment.

13.11.05 Outreach and Social Action Committee (COSA) (Tom Dickinson)

The Outreach and social action committee met on November 12. We discussed the documents we have collected on the community suppers that we host, including recipes, expenses, and organizational details, and plan to put these into a form that will be useful in the future for this effort.

We also discussed upcoming activities that we will be working on and the general topic of what sort of matters we could be bringing before the Meeting.

The next COSA meeting will be January 14, 2014 at the Dickinsons.

13.11.06 Worship and Study (Tom Baskett)

The recent Friendly Forum was well attended and considered a great success. 20 people participated, and it was noted that there was a good deal of sharing when the group paired off in twos. This process will be incorporated in future FF's. The final Forum in the current series will take place December 7 with the theme "Living the Quakerly Life."

The Beth Callea workshop was also successful, offering many thought provoking ideas. Worship and Study and the Childcare Committees will discuss further.

FOLLOW UP: In following through with items discussed at last years State of the Meeting, we agreed to reassess the Healing Circle. W&S will pursue. And there was a brief discussion of the Holiday meeting, where it was clarified that W&S and the Fellowship Committees will share oversight of the event; W&S in charge of the program and Fellowship in charge of logistics.

13.11.07 Fellowship Committee (Peter Schenk)

There will be a holiday fair on December 15. This is an opportunity for anyone to sell, barter, share, or fundraise for themselves or an organization they are associated with. Books, crafts, cards and more are welcome.

The committee will also be updating the greeter list template.

13.11.09 Greg Williams (Cheryl Mitchell)

All in attendance agreed that we are enthusiastic to have Greg come. It was suggested that we contact South Starksboro and Burlington Meetings to see if they are also interested. Perhaps he would like to lead a workshop at a future Quarterly Meeting.

13.11.10 Brenda Christenson

A letter has been received from Durango Meeting introducing Brenda Christenson, who has recently relocated to the Middlebury area. We look forward to meeting her!

13.11.11 Nominating Committee (Cheryl Mitchell)

The committee has filled three positions. Norm Jossem is now on Pastoral Care, replacing Priscilla Baker. Ted Colwell is now officially on COSA, and Mark Moss is our new liason to NW Quarterly Meeting.

Monthly meeting closed after a period of silence.

REPORT FROM THE CONFERENCE

“FACING CLIMATE CHAOS WITH HOPE AND ACTION: EMPOWERING PEOPLE OF FAITH AND SPIRIT”

Sponsored by Vermont Interfaith Power and Light, this conference was attended by 55 members of Climate Committees, or “Green Teams,” from religious groups all over Vermont. Middlebury Friends Meeting was represented by David Andrews, Juliana Kay, and Fran Putnam. There were 10 other attendees from Addison County.

I was struck by this quotation from Gus Speth cited by the first speaker at the conference: “I used to believe that the main problems facing us were biodiversity loss, pollution, and climate change. Now I believe that the main problems are apathy, pride, and greed.”

These were strong words, but they underlined the theme of the conference that religious communities are uniquely positioned to speak to the values and beliefs that underlie our response to climate change, and not necessarily to the science or the politics.

In that vein, I listened for ideas that would lend themselves to what we might do in our Meeting to address our changing climate. One participant said that their Green Team has been in existence for 10 years and has now become integrated in every aspect of the church, from the liturgy, to programs, the library, children’s programs, recycling and composting. Another person said that their climate committee has set goals—long-term, medium-term, and short-term, to guide their work. Our workshop participants hope to keep in touch with one another to exchange ideas on a regular basis.

We also heard from two contractors who showed us two church buildings which have been completely weatherized and are producing all their own power.

I will be reporting more completely to our Climate Committee at our next meeting. Please hold this committee in the Light as we plan ways to inspire our Meeting to contemplate the many ways we can respond to climate change with hope and action. Our next meeting is **Sunday, January 12, 8:45 AM** at Havurah. We welcome any interested Friends to join us.
