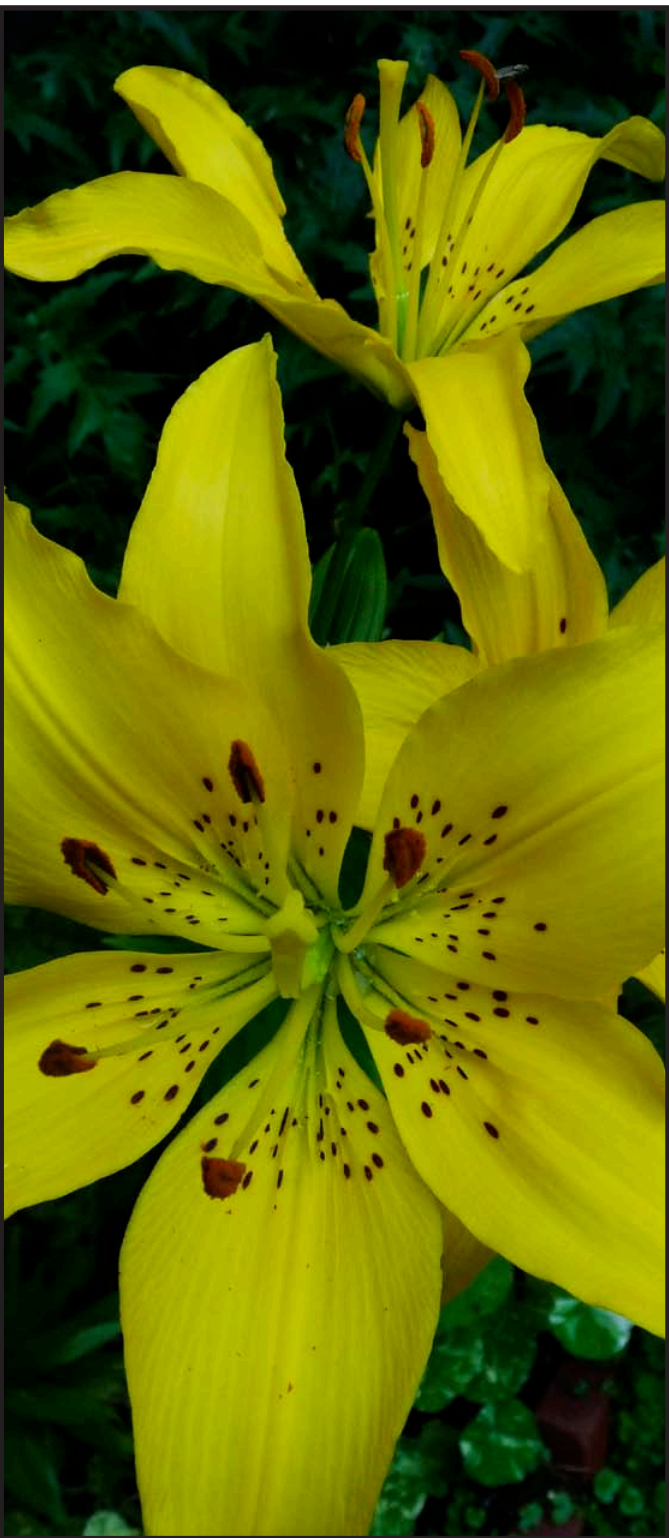

10.06.01 Minutes for 5/16/10 approved as printed in the newsletter.

10.06.02 Treasurer’s Report (Laura Asermily) “During the month of May the Meeting had income of \$1,548.00. Total income for the fiscal year so far is \$10,132.00, leaving us with \$802.00 to raise in the remaining month of the fiscal year. The income for the comparable period last year was \$9,805.35. Expenditures during May totaled \$1,632.75: \$500.00 for rent, \$500.00 for New England Yearly Meeting, \$125.00 for Northwest Quarter, \$180.00 for the children’s program, \$100.00 for gifts to young Friends, \$51.00 for newsletter printing, and \$178.75 for the Community Supper (Outreach line item). The bank balance at the end of May was \$4,982.97, which includes \$1,200.00 in the carry-over surplus fund. The bank balance as of June 20 was \$5,444.67.”

NOTE: We strive to have a balance of a few thousand dollars on June 30, to enable a few large payments at the beginning of the next fiscal year, including rent, yearly meeting and quarterly meeting.

FOLLOW-UP: 1) The \$100 budgeted for Summer Lunch Program may not be needed, in which case, this amount will go to the Community Lunch Program.

2) To date, the \$250 for Quaker conferences and camps has not been requested. Friends are encouraged to consider attending New England Yearly Meeting in Smithfield, RI, from August 7-12. NEYM will also fully fund someone from a monthly meeting that has not had a representative in recent years. To learn more about this opportunity speak to one of the co-clerks.

10.06.03 2010-11 Proposed Budget The budget, as published in the last newsletter, was approved with one addition. It was approved to add \$200 for the financial support of the Ticonderoga Worship Group, to help with advertising and phone service. The worship group is asked to consult with the Finance Committee next winter about the next fiscal year budget. If Friends have any questions about the worship group or suggestions for more efficient financial management, they are encouraged to talk directly with Mark Moss and Mary Kay Glazer.

10.06.04 Friends United Meeting financial support: Prompted by a participant's desire to contribute to MFM but, led by conscience, does not wish her funds to benefit Friends United Meeting (FUM), it was decided that Tom Dickinson and the Finance Committee will look into how NEYM handles donations/allocation earmarked to not go to FUM. It is noted that MFM is in the process of threshing out our stand vis a vis NEYM's financial support of FUM, with the intention of reaching a sense of the meeting.

10.06.05 Worship and Study Committee (presented by Win Colwell; recorded by Becky Holmes & edited for these minutes by the recording clerk)

1. *Welcome:* The group welcomed Marg Collins as a new member of the committee.
2. *Recommendations for Business Meeting:* Our discussion centered on the inherent conflict between patient process and modern efficiency; suggestions for better efficiency will be presented at monthly meeting.
3. *Friendly Forums and threshing session:* It is suggested that a threshing session be dedicated for exploring what relationship the Meeting is to have with FUM, perhaps combined with a potluck similar to the State of the Meeting meeting. This may be coordinated with the Fellowship and Outreach committees since those groups would be directly involved as well.
4. *Traveling Friend:* Deb Humphries, a Traveling Friend from Connecticut, will be visiting MFM for two days, September 11-12. Her particular interest is on spirituality in Meetings. Consideration will be given to how to welcome her to MFM.
5. *Ticonderoga Worship Group:* Mary Kay Glazer and Mark Moss encourage members of Worship and Study Committee and Meeting in general to visit the Worship Group which meets at 4:00 on Sundays at the Glazer-Moss home.

FOLLOW-UP: After suggestions were heard, to make monthly meetings more efficient, concern was expressed about shortening the time allotted for monthly meetings; however, there is interest in sending out committee reports ahead of time as well as committees reporting to monthly meeting only those items that are pertinent to the conduct of MFM business. It is hoped that by sending out committee reports via the google group, a few days before MM Sunday, Friends will be prepared for items that will come up for discussion at MM.

10.06.06 Committee on Outreach and Social Action (Tom Dickinson, edited for these minutes by the recording clerk)

1. *The relationship between MFM and Friends United Meeting (FUM):* There have been two well-attended Friendly Forums on the issue of FUM personnel policies and their decision-making and governance practices. It is clear the time is ripe for this discussion and that we are not close to consensus on the collective position of our Meeting. We will work with the Worship and Study and Fellowship Committees to develop the idea of an evening dessert potluck followed by a threshing session.

2. *MFM relationship with New England Yearly Meeting (NEYM):* Many of us are not familiar with the activities and function of our Yearly Meeting and few MFM members have attended NEYM in recent years. We will encourage attendance and using our budgeted funds to assist this.

10.06.07 Pastoral Care Committee: (Grace McGrath) A memorial minute for Burton Knopp was drafted and presented. After reading the minute, Friends sat in collective silence for several minutes. The minute was approved and will be sent on to quarterly and yearly meetings. It will be sent to Burt's family along with an offer to read it at his memorial service on June 26. 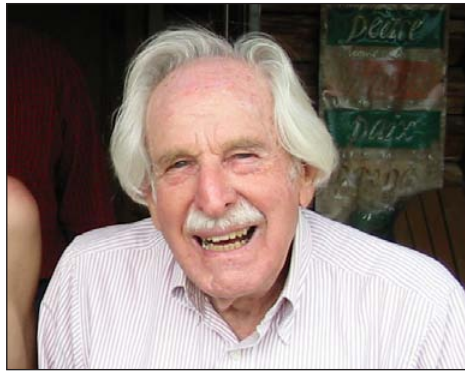

10.06.09 Oversight committee for Laurel and Aaron Coburn's Recommitment Meeting for Marriage: Karen Nawn-Fahey reported for the oversight committee (Karen, Becky Stratton and Chris Stackhouse) that they met several times with Laurel and Aaron Coburn to address many practical and logistical details in preparation for their meeting for recommitment on June 19. All who attended agreed that the day was a successful gathering of Friends and family due, in large part, to the organizing before and on the actual day.

10.06.10 Nominating Committee (Cheryl Mitchell)

The final report of committee members and other tasks for the following fiscal year was considered and approved. It will be published in the newsletter.

MEMORIAL MINUTE FOR BURTON KNOPP DECEMBER 7, 1916 – MARCH 31, 2010

Burt Knopp: “Never better!” No matter what, this is how he would always answer the question, “How are you, Burt?”

He strongly believed in living in the moment, and he managed to live that way. He knew how to take the energy of the world and pass it back through his life.

Burt was born in Waterbury, CT. in 1916. He graduated from Temple University after working his way through college.

In 1941, he married Fay Honey Irving, and they were married just five days short of 55 years until her death in 1995. Burt loved his wife, a social activist and prison reformer, and helped her in her many endeavors. He loved his children, Sari Knopp Biklen of Syracuse, NY and Alex Knopp of Norwalk, CT. Twenty-five years ago, the four of them built Honey and Burt’s log house together.

Burt loved to cook. He loved his garden and his bees. He loved to go to farmers markets with his honey. He took a hive to Addison County elementary schools for many years to demonstrate how bees were active as they made honey.

He loved music of all kinds, and loved making music with banjos, guitars and a wash-tub base. In the 60s and 70s, Burt played with many folksong groups.

He volunteered his time in many useful ways, at Porter Hospital, where he logged over 1,500 hours as a volunteer x-ray developer, in the Shoreham Historical Society, the Co-op and in numerous Peace and Protest groups. He was also a Mason.

Burt took great pleasure in his children and four grandchildren: Molly, Noah, Jesse and Andrew. He loved to talk about them, and delighted in what they were doing in the world. For instance, he proudly told us his grand-daughter was married by Justice Sotomayor, whose clerk she had been.

He was never too busy to talk with all kinds of people. He knew how to make himself available, and when we spoke with Burt, he made us feel that we had his complete attention, and appreciation.



FRIENDLY BOOKS OF INTEREST

Pendle Hill Pamphlets

Oxford University Press, New York, 2001, 248 pgs.

This is a reminder and an encouragement for MFM people to take advantage of the large number of Pendle Hill pamphlets our library contains. These are short booklets covering a wide range of topics all related to Quakerism, written by a large number of men and women who have widely ranging views of what it means to be a Friend.

With our library purchasing a number of these pamphlets recently, I have been checking one or two out every few weeks and have found them very worthy reading, adding to my understanding of the varieties of thought amongst us.

One was “The Mindful Quaker: A Brief Introduction to Buddhist Wisdom for Friends” by Valarie Brown. In a few pages it gives the salient points of Buddhist beliefs and practices, and points out the numerous areas of agreement with Friends’ concepts.

Another was “The Character of Henry Cadbury” that traces the life of this modern times Quaker, one who played a key role in many of the new areas of action and principles. It was Cadbury who went to Oslo to accept the Nobel Prize for Peace, wearing formal tails borrowed from a used clothing shop!

Elizabeth Gray Vining was a Quaker who became famous when she was asked by the Emperor of Japan following the surrender of his country after WW II to come to Tokyo to help in the education of the Crown Prince. She wrote “A Quest There Is,” a series of short meditations on various poems and sayings that she felt were important guides for all of us.

I urge you to check out one or more of these pamphlets from our collection and have a treat. They are almost always on display at every Meeting For Worship.

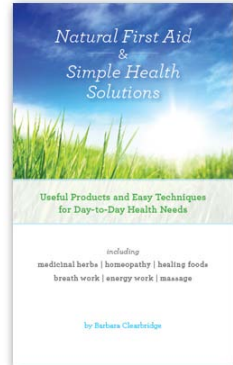
